Upon Arrival

AIRPORT ARRIVAL

Tortola's airport is situated at Beef Island, at the eastern end of Tortola.

Airport Code: EIS. Beef Island Airport to Wickhams Cay II Marina - Taxi ride: 30 mins.

If you are flying into Cyril E. King International Airport, St Thomas (USVI), we are not able to book the ferry nor a taxi in St Thomas for you. You will need to book your own ferry or private water taxi.

AIRPORT OR FERRY TERMINAL TRANSFERS

The Moorings can assist with arranging your transfers on Tortola which should be booked and paid in advance. Please send your travel details to our Pre-departure team to assist you with this.

If you have a pre-booked transfer, the local driver will be advised of your name and arrival time and carry a The Moorings sign to identify themselves to you at the pick-up location.

The cost of the ride is per person:

From Tortola airport (EIS) to the base (or return):

30-minute ride:

Shared: \$16 pp

Private: 1-2 pax \$50pp; \$25 per additional passenger

VIP: 1-2 pax \$100pp; \$50 per additional passenger

Ferry Terminal to the base (or return):

Road Town - Shared: \$8pp

Road Town - Private: 1-2 pax \$19pp; \$10 per additional passenger

West End - Shared: \$16pp

West End - Private: \$25pp

CAR RENTAL

In the BVI, drivers keep to the left side of the road, even though most rental cars have the steering wheel on the left. This can feel unfamiliar at first, and drivers may stop suddenly or hesitate at times. Be sure to leave plenty of space between vehicles and drive cautiously.

There are a couple of rent-a-car companies on the island, our Customer Service would be happy to help you arrange for a pick-up and drop-off directly at the reception:

CHECK IN AT OUR RECEPTION

When you arrive at the marina, please go to The Moorings reception where our team will help to check you in.

- Mobile phone number that works in the BVI
- Credit card for payment of your yacht's security deposit
- Please ensure all pre-departure tasks have been completed prior to your arrival to avoid any delays.

LATE ARRIVALS

If you arrive after office hours, please speak to security who will be notified to expect your late arrival, and will be able to direct you to your yacht.



OUT OF HOURS ARRIVAL

If you provide arrival details later than 23.00, we always try to have our Customer Service Staff available. In case of out-of-hours arrival, the security will make sure to show you to your boat.

SLEEP ABOARD

An evening Sleep Aboard is available as a pre-paid extra and can be organized in advance of your arrival to the base with your vacation planner. **Boarding time is brought forward to 6pm** the evening before your charter start date. This means you can settle into your yacht and set sail the following day. Please note that availability is limited and not be possible during peak travel dates. Guests will receive their briefing the following morning.

EMBARKATION TIME

Your **boarding time is at 12pm noon**. We thank you for your patience and understanding whilst waiting to board your yacht. Please ensure you have left your mobile phone number with our reception team who will contact you as soon as your yacht is ready.

LUGGAGE STORAGE

We offer secure storage; however, the base will not accept liability for items left in the bags. Luggage stored during charter should be empty. If you are leaving your luggage for the duration of the week, please remember to collect your luggage before departure. The Moorings cannot take any responsibility for any eventual damage or loss to the items left in storage.

EMBARKATION TIME

Boarding is **12pm noon**, and disembarkation is **11:00 am for sail**. Important to note that disembarkation is **10:00am for power**.





Briefings

CHART BRIEFING

Enjoy more time on the water by watching the required [chart briefing HERE](#) prior to your arrival from the comfort of your home. Feel free to share the links with your fellow crew and start to build your perfect week. After viewing this, take note of any outstanding questions and discuss these with our teams upon arrival at our base.

Only Skipper and First Mate can participate in the face-to-face meeting at the base. The times of briefings will differ dependant on your arrival time and briefer availability.

Chart Briefing times:

- A mandatory face to face chart briefing will be provided in the chart briefing room at: 9.30am / 12pm / or 4pm daily.
- For all guests arriving later than 4pm, who miss the final briefing, please attend the 9.30am session the following morning.

HEALTH AND SAFETY BRIEFING

We take the safety of all our customers very seriously. Please ensure you and each of your crew watch our health and [safety video here](#) prior to your arrival. This will ensure you are all set for a fun and safe week on the water.

YACHT BRIEFING

Once you have boarded your yacht, a briefer will go through all the technical aspects of the yacht and safety equipment. Please note that the skipper and first mate should both be present for this briefing. Yacht briefings are assigned on a first come, first serve basis. For those arriving outside of reception hours, or those that have opted for a sleep aboard, your yacht briefing will be delivered the following morning.

CHARTER WITH SKIPPER

The skipper's time is booked from 12:00 to 12:00 for early boarding starts.

The skipper is responsible for the safety of the yacht at all times. The skipper is not permitted to dive with you, nor leave the vessel overnight, and must have his/her own cabin. The skipper must conduct a safety brief with you before leaving the dock regardless of the duration of his/her contract with you.

If you hired a skipper for less than the full duration of your charter, he/she is still required to give you a thorough briefing on all aspects of the yacht and dinghy in addition to assisting you with planning an itinerary for the trip and advising you how to contact the base, the return to base procedures and the emergency assistance procedures. It is suggested that you view the chart briefing online that will be supplemented by the skipper during his/her time with you on the yacht. It is also suggested that you make it clear what exactly you want to cover: anchoring, docking, etc.

The skipper will be required to give you as much information as you require concerning the yacht and its systems, sailing skills, and navigation in general. For one-day check out skippers, it is the client's responsibility to get the skipper back to the base. If you prefer not to come back to the base you must pay for his/her expenses (ferry, taxi, etc.) to get him/her back to the base. .

A gratuity of 15-20% of the skipper fee is appreciated for excellent service, however some customers feel it appropriate to tip at a percentage of the overall charter price for outstanding service.

SAILING LICENSE

Although no sailing licences are required for cruising in the BVI, you will need to fill out our online [sailing Resume](#) to see if you have the experience to charter a yacht with The Moorings. If you have a sailing certificate, we strongly recommend that you take this on vacation with you too.

Optional Extras

PROVISIONING

You can pre-order your food and drink provisions in advance of your arrival. Please visit our online provisioning store [HERE](#). Please note provisioning orders must be submitted 5 days prior to your arrival.

Your confirmed order will be delivered to your boat on the day of your boarding.

If you miss the cut-off date or forget to add an item to your order, there are plenty of local stores available. Please see the [useful information section](#) of the guide for further details.

[The Moorings Market](#) is open from 8:00 - 19:00 daily, weekends until 20:00.

YACHT DAMAGE WAIVER

Our **Yacht Damage Waiver** can be added to your charter account any time prior to you leaving the marina. The pre-paid, daily amount reduces your liability in the case of damage caused to the yacht or the loss of equipment on board.

A **security deposit is required for all charters**. The amount will vary based on the size and type of yacht being chartered, please consult our terms and conditions for further information [HERE](#). You will be requested to sign a statement confirming the deposit amount.

FUEL

- **Sailing:** A full tank of fuel is included in the price for all The Moorings sailing yachts. Pick up the yacht with a full tank, plus there is no need to refuel at the end
- **Power:** Pre-pay your fuel ahead of time and eliminate the worry about refueling your yacht upon return.

WI-FI

Wi-Fi is included on our Exclusive, Exclusive Plus & Crewed yachts, and an optional addition for our Club yachts.

If you have included, or pre-paid, Wi-Fi please ensure you have the router on board your yacht prior to leaving the base location.

FISHING GEAR

If you plan to fish in the BVI, you will need to **obtain your recreational fishing license** directly from Sail Caribbean. For instructions on how to apply for a fishing permit, please visit [Fishing Permits — Sail Caribbean Divers](#).

Please take note of the following:

- Once granted the fishing permit, it is only valid for one month.
- Taking lobster and spearfishing (any method) are prohibited.
- It is illegal to have billed fish in one's possession or to have more than 30 lbs by weight in one's possession per boat.
- Sail Caribbean Divers offers spinning rods and trolling rods for daily and weekly rental.

SAFETY NETTING

For those travelling with children, we do suggest adding safety netting to your yacht. This is a chargeable extra and must be organised in advance of your arrival to the base.





Optional Extras

Enjoy a carefree holiday on the water.

You can pre-order our optional extra's in advance of your arrival in the BVI. Please ask our reception team upon your arrival if there is something you have forgotten.

STAND UP PADDLE BOARDS (SUPs)

SUPs are light and easy to manoeuvre which makes them a great option when exploring the coastlines and heading to the beach from your yacht.

KAYAKS

Our one and two person kayaks provide the freedom to explore our bays and beaches plus can be great fun. Ensure you are wearing your life vests and see our swim safe policy on [page 18](#) for further guidance.

SAFETY NETTING

For those travelling with children, we do suggest adding safety netting to your yacht. This is a chargeable extra and must be organised in advance of your arrival to the base.





On Board Your Yacht

ELECTRICITY

The standard voltage on all our yachts is 12 volts and you will find plenty of USB sockets throughout the yacht. Throughout the yacht you can also find plenty of 110V AC outlets, standard USA 3 pin outlets (can also take 2 pin USA plugs). To use them, your yacht either needs to be connected to shore power, or be equipped with an inverter, or have the generator running. Most of our catamarans have a generator and inverter, however, be mindful that it depends on the model you booked.

BBQ/GRILL

All yachts are equipped with a barbecue; the type of grill may differ between electric or charcoal depending on the type of yacht you are chartering. If required, feel free to order some briquettes and fire starters at the store!

While in use, please move your dinghy to the bow and have a bucket of water handy. The base does not provide charcoal nor lighter fluid. If there are any leftovers from the previous charter, these will be offered to guests free of charge. Otherwise, guests will have to purchase the items themselves.

Please do not dispose of charcoal or any other items in the ocean.

COOLER BOXES

All The Moorings catamarans are equipped with one cooler box per yacht.

MUSIC

All The Moorings yacht stereos can be paired to your device via Bluetooth. We recommend having your music downloaded in case you are sailing in an area without good Wi-Fi signal.

ICE

Ice is available in the base; each boat gets 2 bags of complimentary ice. More is available from the onsite The Moorings Market.

WATER MAKER

If your yacht is fitted with a water maker, please note you should use this as directed in your briefing, and never in less than 10-feet of water. The water maker is not considered essential equipment and is not covered under [The Moorings 4-hour commitment](#). If your water maker is not working, there are locations within your cruising grounds where you can purchase water.

BEFORE LEAVING THE BASE

- Please ensure you have all the kitchen equipment and bedding you require. Extra bedding and some cooking utensils are available upon request.
- Check out fins from boxes next to reception. We have a range of sizes available, however these are limited, so we request that you take only what you will use. Take note that we are no longer providing snorkelling masks or snorkels.
- Check your safety equipment. We have a limited supply of children's life jackets (ages 4+ only) to rent.
- Make sure the fuel/water tanks are full.
- Make sure you have your yacht papers with the last customs clearance.
- Make sure you are provisioned.
- Make sure you have enough cash.





Whilst Out On The Water

ACCIDENTS AND COLLISIONS

While out sailing things can happen where an accident or collision with another vessel occurs. If you are unfortunate enough to be involved in one, please contact the base immediately.

Please follow the check list below on what needs to be completed no matter how big or small the accident or collision with another vessel is:

- Check all persons are safe and no injuries.
- Make sure the vessel is in a safe area and no further injuries or damage can occur.
- Return back to dockage/anchorage, even if it looks like no damage is visible.
- Skipper of both vessels need to exchange contact details for later reference.
- Photograph the damaged area if damage has been induced.
- Please note that not returning to the scene of a collision or accident does make the situation a little more complicated.

MAINTAIN A LOOKOUT

All our yachts are equipped with an autopilot. Make sure one person is always maintaining a lookout, especially if the auto pilot is on. This person should be close to the helm and should watch for other vessel, debris, fish pots, land, or other navigational hazards.

Make sure your lookout knows how to disengage the autopilot and brief him / her on what to watch out for. Breaking water or patches of light-coloured water and brown areas may indicate shallow water or rocks. Seeing one fish pot usually means that there will be others.

ACCIDENTAL GROUNDING

If you should accidentally run aground the most important thing is to check everyone is ok & get off again as soon as possible - for those purposes, please call VISAR, or the coast guard immediately followed by the base, and we will provide you with immediate assistance.

SECURITY

- The entire marina is under 24/7 security.
- Whilst out on charter please ensure you take the appropriate precautions as advised by the base to lock valuables when leaving the yacht.
- As this is a public space, please note we cannot in any way be held responsible for any loss or damage to private property.

NIGHT SAILING

Night Sailing is not permitted; you must be moored at least one hour before sunset at all our locations. It is strictly forbidden to sail alone; we require two persons minimum on board.

DINGHY SAFETY

We are counting on our guests to be mindful around their dinghy. Ensure you are towing and/or stowing this correctly whilst out on the water. Please ensure you take proper precautions when operating the dinghy and have the kill cord attached to your person at all times whilst underway. A flashlight must be used at night while underway.

Additionally, please ensure your dinghy is secure when docked and locked. If you require a dinghy ladder, these can be rented from [Sail Caribbean Dive Shop](#), next to reception.

WATER AND GARBAGE

Water can be purchased at most of the islands you will be sailing to. We cover this topic in the [chart briefing](#), or you can find more information in the Destinations section of this guide.

Never give your garbage to local sailors, you should dispose of it directly in garbage points along the coast or simply at the base.

MOORING TIPS

Most overnight stops in the BVI will be at mooring buoys/ anchor as opposed to alongside quays.

There is a colour system for buoys and flags in the national parks which is as follows:

- **White balls with a blue stripe** - for overnight stays, 45\$ USD; first comes, first served.
- **Blue balls** - for dinghies only. There is a rope between two blue buoys which you are supposed to use when tying your dinghy.
- **Yellow balls** - for diving boats only.
- **Red small buoys** - for day stays only, 90-minute stop.
- **Orange large buoys** - BoatyBalls.

Boatyballs are new, large, and orange balls that one can book online at boatyball.com, for the day of the arrival. They usually get filled up by 7am, and their price is 10\$ USD more expensive than white balls (55 \$). Do not pick them up unless you have a reservation.

The National Parks Fee and your Cruising Permit have already been prepared for your yacht before your arrival. This does not include the 3\$ pp fee to the greater Baths area. In the case you are entering a park on foot, make sure to take it with you to avoid double-payment. An environmental and tourism levy of \$10 USD per person (3 years & older) will be collected on arrival at the ports of entry.

Make sure not to drive over a mooring buoy when leaving and do not anchor or fish in marine parks to avoid any fines. It is also not allowed to try to save a spot on buoys with a dinghy. Please also note their holding tanks need to be closed in Marine parks.

A great way to keep track of the ever-changing situations is to visit bvitourism.com for any updates. Marinas usually have good websites, and even better-maintained Facebook sites to check for current information while in the region. Do not forget to hail any marina on VHF Ch. 16 on approach to get instruction and assistance.





4-Hour Commitment

We maintain our fleet to the highest standards so you can make the most of your time on the water. However, if you have a breakdown or technical problems, please contact your base team so we can support you. For essential equipment we provide a 4-Hour Commitment. This means we will attend to the yacht within four working hours of you notifying us of the breakdown of any essential equipment (judged by the opening hours of the base reception). We are able to support you with the breakdown of unessential equipment too however this may not be attended to within 4 hours of us being notified.

Boat Papers & Procedures

COASTGUARD

During your time on the water, you may be stopped by the coastguard who may carry out some routine checks. Do not be alarmed this is a standard process. The coast guard will likely check your crew list to ensure this is accurate, the registration documents of the yacht, your tourist status and you may need to display your sailing qualification/licence if this is a requirement for your destination. You may be fined if there are passengers onboard the yacht that are not listed on the crew list or if you cannot provide the relevant paperwork.

VISIT THE USVI

If you plan to visit the USVI on charter, please **announce your intention** to your Vacation Planner, or at the base before you go so, we can advise on the procedure and paperwork required. Basic procedure below:

If you plan to **visit the USVI during your charter**, you are required to **officially clear out of the BVI** before departure, and clear back in upon return.

The USVI—comprised primarily of St. Thomas, St. John, and St. Croix—are outside of BVI jurisdiction, and any entry into USVI waters requires specific steps to remain compliant with BVI regulations.

To help you avoid any issues and ensure a smooth journey, we've outlined the [key requirements here](#).

Please note: If your itinerary remains solely within BVI waters, this does not apply.



Your Safety

STAY SAFE & HEALTHY ABROAD

Please locate your safety card when you get onboard and ensure that all crew read it before leaving the marina. If you cannot find it, then please contact reception who can provide a replacement. Although you will have watched the **online Charter Safety Briefing** before leaving home, we recommend that you rewatch the video before leaving the dock. This can be done on your own devices using the QR code.

SWIM SAFE

Swimming is often a fun and important part of a vacation. However local rules, flag systems, currents and where swimming may be permitted, can be different and vary from country to country. We strongly recommend that you and all your crew read through our 'swim safe' information online before you travel. Unfortunately even the strongest of swimmers can get into difficulties. The information on our website covers children, your surroundings, looking out for others, and not overestimating your own ability. Snorkel vests, life jackets (please see [page 12](#) for advise on what is available) and diver down flags are all available on board.

Return to Base

DISEMBARKATION TIME

Please ensure you fully vacate your yacht no later than the time indicated below:

11am for sail | 10am for power | 12pm for crewed

RETURN PROCEDURE

- Please empty all holding tanks and bilges before returning to base (2 nautical miles offshore). Make sure your holding tanks are closed while you are in the marina.
- Prepare your lines and fenders.
- Call the The Moorings base about 15 mins before arriving, or when next to the cruise ships as you will be in range, on VHF Ch. 12 to get instructions for docking. Remember to mention the name of your boat 3 times.
- If you need additional help, the dock master can arrange for assistance in docking the vessel.
- Please note that the dockmasters work between 8am-5pm, so you will not be able to dock outside of those hours. Make sure your dinghy is on the bow before entering the marina (applicable to both monohulls & catamarans). Please ensure the dinghy padlock is on the boat and not left on the dinghy.
- Follow the refuelling guidance provided below.
- One of our staff will guide you to your designated berth. The team will also help you dock

RE-FUELLING

For sail charters - one full tank is included, & there is no need to pre-pay or refuel post charter.

For power charters - fuel is prepaid & there is no need to refuel post charter.

For crewed charters - fuel is included.

**One full tank suffices for any holiday, however, to fuel up, please ask at the base for advice, as we like to keep contaminated fuel away from our tanks.*

BEFORE YOU LEAVE YOUR YACHT

Before disembarkation, you will be met with a debriefer. It is done to let us know if you have encountered any problems with the boat or broken anything during the trip, so we can rectify any problems for the next charter.

Please ensure:

- Allow 15-20 minutes for an on-board debrief with a member of the customer service team to record any maintenance issues experienced during your charter.
- Navigational instruments have been covered and sailing bag has been closed.
- Charts, keys and guidebook have been left on the chart table.
- All rubbish has been removed and disposed of in marina bins or left on the dock for collecting.
- All cupboards and refrigerator have been emptied of food.
- All sheets and towels should be left on the bed inside pillowcases.
- Snorkelling fins to be rinsed and placed back into the cockpit locker.
- All personal possessions have been removed; please check thoroughly as items are often left onboard.
- All hatches are closed

Weather

PREVAILING WINDS

Prevailing winds in the BVI are always easterlies, from November to January northeasterlies, 15 to 20 knots in strength. By June, the wind generally shifts to the SE at 10 to 15 knots. During September and October, the trade winds are at its weakest and the weather can be less settled.

WEATHER FORECASTS

You will be given a two-day forecast at the beginning of your charter. The weather forecast will be discussed in your chart briefing.

HURRICANE SEASON

The official **hurricane season starts on 1 June and ends 30 November**. Information on tropical systems is available from many sources 4 - 5 days before these weather conditions are experienced in the BVI.

CNN Weather Channel, the Office of Disaster Preparedness and the radio stations all issue regular updates on any tropical disturbances. Additional information can be obtained via the internet.

The base keeps track of any major weather disturbances and will reach out with any warnings if necessary.





Marine Life

JELLYFISH

There are many species of jellyfish in the cruising area and there have been several instances where clients who have been stung by jellyfish have required hospital treatment. If you have allergies, it is advised to wear stinger suits or refrain from swimming.



If you are stung:

- Immediately exit the water and apply copious amounts of vinegar to the affected area.
- Pour vinegar over the tentacle before attempting to remove it with tweezers.
- Do not try to rinse it off with fresh water and
- **DO NOT RUB!**
- You can then immerse the affected limb in hot salt water or apply a hot compress and antihistamine cream.
- Generally, the affected area will usually only be a minor irritation, similar to a bee sting and the sting area is normally itchy. Should you start to experience any additional symptoms you should contact the base immediately for help and advice on where to seek medical assistance.

CORAL STINGS AND CUTS

People get more injuries from fire coral (bright orange), than from anything else, so it helps to wear protective footies and gloves. Avoid touching any type of coral, it is very delicate and can easily break.

Cuts and abrasions caused from coral have a considerable risk of infection, so thoroughly clean the wound as soon as possible and apply copious amounts of vinegar and immerse in hot water or apply a hot compress. Avoid swimming afterwards.

SEA URCHINS

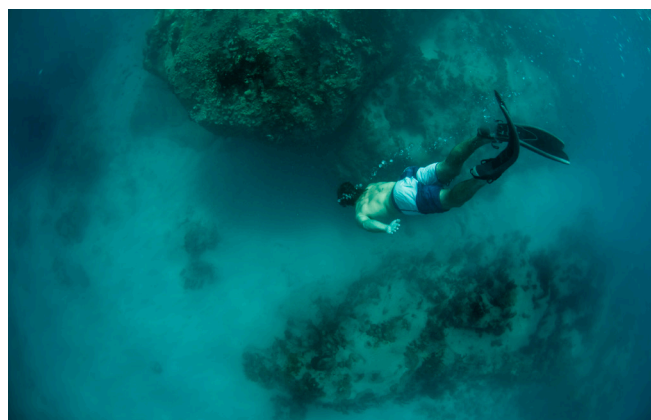
Sea urchins are not poisonous, but their spines are very painful if touched or stepped on and will normally break off if attempting to pull them out with tweezers. Again, hot water is the best treatment and leaving vinegar-soaked cloth on the injured spot, so the spines get out.

FISH AND CIGUATERA

Ciguatera is caused by a neurotoxin which is only present in reef fish. There is no telling if fish are contaminated, so best avoid eating reef fish and stick to deep water fish, like swordfish, dolphin, tuna and wahoo.

Symptoms include tingling of the lips, mouth and tongue, itching skin, fever, chills, muscle and joint aches, weakness, vomiting and diarrhoea. Seek medical attention immediately.

If you happen to be stung by a fish immediately exit the water and treat with hot water. You may require a tetanus injection.





LIONFISH ALERT!

Pacific lionfish are an invasive species, destroying the coral reefs and very aggressive. If stung, get out of the water, apply the hottest water tolerable, and call VISAR.

Although venomous, the flesh of the fish is not poisonous, so it is safe to eat. The Conservation and Fisheries Department is encouraging people to make it their next meal, so to help keep their populations at bay.

If you see the Lionfish, try and place a marker, record the location and depth and contact the Department of Fisheries at 001 284 494 34 29, or one of local dive operators. You can also visit them on bvi.gov.vg.



MANCHINEEL TREES

Recognised by their tiny apple-like fruit, yellow or yellow green in colour. **DO NOT eat the fruits** or even sit underneath the tree in the rain. They grow along the shore and their toxin causes rashes and, in extreme cases, death.



Other Useful Information

CURRENCY AND CREDIT CARDS

- USD is the currency used throughout the British Virgin Islands and credit cards are widely accepted except in smaller establishments.
- US Banks are situated in Road Town, Tortola and Spanish Town, Virgin Gorda and operate under normal banking hours: 9:00 — 14:00, Monday through Friday.
- Local banks on Tortola include First Caribbean, Banco Popular, Scotia Bank and First Bank.
- ATMs are limited. Please bring the cash you will need for your entire stay.
- Visa and Mastercard are accepted by most restaurants and hotels, as well as by local stores and supermarkets.

DRONES

The use of flying drones may be restricted in some areas. For current drone regulations in this destination, please visit www.bvi.gov.vg.

LANGUAGE

The language of the British Virgin Islands is **English**.

LOCAL CUSTOMS

Travelers are required to complete the online Immigration and Customs Form which will be available 72 hours prior to your arrival in The British Virgin Islands.

Once the form is completed, the Immigration and Customs receipts are to be saved to your mobile device or printed and presented to Immigration and Customs upon arrival. [Start application here](#).

GROCERIES

Nearby provisioning options:

- **Rite Way shop** - 5 min. walking distance
Open Sun-Thu from 6:30-21:00
- **One Mart** - 10 min. walking distance
Open from 7:00 - 22:00 daily
- **Bobby's** - 10 min. driving distance
Open from 7:00 - 24:00 daily

After choosing the goods you will need for your charter, the shops offer delivery to the boat. You will need to provide your contract or booking reference number to the 3rd party provisioning store, and they will advise of their arrival time and inquire with the front desk about the location of your vessel. Also, consider that you will not find any supermarkets on the islands, so make sure you have all the provisions you need before departure.

Weekends are the busiest time in the base, so we kindly ask for some patience. The base is constantly looking to improve their product and service, and we are looking forward to future upgrades in restaurants, online stores, and new utilities, which are coming soon.

RESTAURANTS AND TIPPING

As well as the three restaurants on the base, there are numerous options a short taxi ride away from the base, in Road Town. Most restaurants within the BVI close at 22:00, so make sure to leave enough time for dinner.

During low season (mid-August to beginning October) all the restaurants are closed, so you should provision accordingly. This would be a perfect time of year to enjoy a BBQ off the back of your boat.

For more information on restaurants in Tortola, Virgin Gorda, Anegada, Jost van Dyke and other islands please speak to our base team who will be happy to provide information and recommendations.

Tipping is standard and expected in all restaurants/bars and for other services undertaken during your vacation. The rule of thumb is 15-20% of the amount charged. Some establishments automatically add this onto the bill, so make sure to read it closely.

SAIL CARIBBEAN DIVERS

Our partners can be found next to the reception area, taking care of all water sports equipment, such as diving equipment, kids' life jackets, fishing licenses, and equipment, Stand up paddle boards, snorkelling masks, souvenirs, dinghy ladder rental, etc.

DIVING AND SNORKELLING

- When snorkelling from your yacht, please ensure that you utilise the snorkelling vests onboard, as well as the diving flag and buoy to ensure you are visible in the water.
- One person should always remain onboard or out of the water to keep watch on the snorkellers.
- We have a range of fins available in various sizes. We do have limited children's sizes therefore we recommend bringing your own to avoid disappointment. Please note that **we do not provide snorkelling masks or snorkels onboard.**
- BVI's have a range of interesting diving spots, like the sunken RMS Rhone, or Willy T, staged with pirates' skeletons performing daily activities. Artificially created dive sites like this are provided by Beyond the Reef non-profit foundation. One can donate to their cause in the base and find more information online [HERE](#).
- It is not permitted to dive independently. Rendezvous diving is advisable, which can be booked through local operators on the islands. [Sail Caribbean Divers](#) has an office on our base — they are a PADI 5-star IDC centre offering rendezvous diving at various points throughout the BVI, for certified and non-certified divers.

FISHING

- Fishing equipment can be added to your The Moorings Charter, so make sure to inquire about it with your Vacation Planner.
- Vessel registration is required for any boat wanting to fish in the BVI, we offer this on all our catamaran fleet in Tortola.
- In addition to the vessel registration, [a personal fishing license](#) is required for any adult fishing in the BVI's. Sunsail diving and fishing equipment partner, Sail Caribbean Divers, has provided this Fishing License Application for your convenience. The cost is \$65 USD per person and permits are valid for 1 month. Please email your application at least 2 weeks in advance of the charter to allow for adequate preparation of your licenses.
- You will be able to pick up your fishing permit and sign-out your equipment at [Sail Caribbean Divers](#), in the shop next to reception, when you arrive at the base.
- Please note that **you may not fish in the National Parks**, and unless fishing well offshore, fish should not be eaten due to Ciguatera poisoning. No spear fishing is allowed.

TRIPS AND EXCURSIONS

- **Island tours** can be arranged for everybody looking to learn a little bit more about Tortola. Find out more details about it from our Customer Care at reception.
- There are also a **couple of great beaches** on the Tortola Island that one can visit before boarding, or while doing the island tour, the closest one being Cane Garden Bay.

Sailing Area Restrictions

BVI TO USVI

Bareboat charters are permitted to sail into the USVI. If you wish to sail into the USVI you must be a US citizen, resident, or have a US Visa which has to be obtained before arrival in the Caribbean. You must follow all customs procedures and ensure you are clear on these before leaving the base. Bareboat charters with any hired crew onboard, may not sail to the USVI (crewed yachts, captain/skipper, cook, etc.)

Please discuss your intentions with the base if you wish to sail to the USVI, since it is outside our [4-Hour Commitment](#).

ANEGADA

If sailing to Anegada, be aware that we do not provide for the [4-Hour Commitment](#) service there. Pay close attention to our Red & Amber Zones when planning your itinerary.



Red and Amber Zones

These are a part of the region where guests need to pay special attention, and/or may need to avoid the areas altogether.

You will have signed the Yacht Acceptance form inside the check-in check-out booklet after your yacht briefing stating you understand these zones and their dangers.

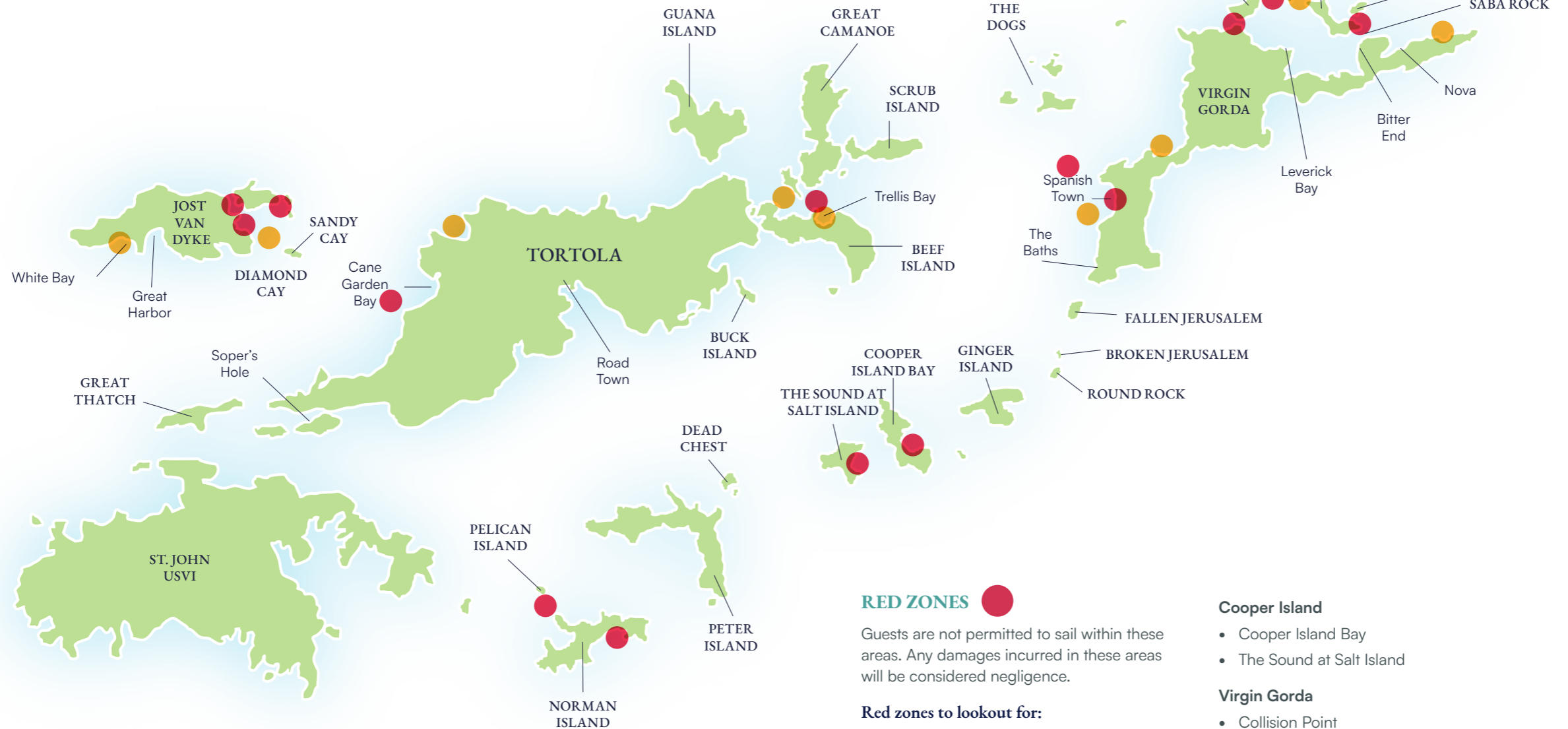

A visit to Anegada is well worth the 11-mile sail from the North Sound, offering a completely different landscape from the other BVIs. With its highest point just 28 feet above sea level, this coral island stretches 11 miles and is surrounded by Horseshoe Reef, renowned for its abundant lobsters and conch—making Anegada famous for its fresh lobster dinners. The island's main anchorage, Setting Point, has a partially marked entrance channel, so careful navigation is required. Once ashore, explore the island by renting a car, moped, or mini-moke, and discover the north shore's breathtaking beaches or the salt ponds, where Caribbean flamingos and other migratory birds can often be spotted. Please note Anegada is an amber zone and caution should be taken when accessing through the narrow channel.
